I am, the Lord!

The continuous self revelation of God as the ever present "I am", has been constant and consistent in all of human history. For even the whole of creation itself tells of the power and glory of God. Everything God has created all speaks of his eternal presence. In a more graphic and compelling way, on this third Sunday, we recall the experience from the burning Bush, as Moses is called by God to lead his people out of slavery to the freedom of knowing him and living for him alone, the great "I am." For anyone who then chose to live a life outside of "the I am" therefore, is a choice to live in perpetual slavery and emptiness. Lent comes to show us and help us to trace the way back to our father, an ever present father who does not only know our afflictions but sees them, understands and cares about them. Because he knows our sufferings, whenever we cry, he hears! And he rescues us, praise the Lord who sets us free!

His name is in the present continuous tense: "I am who I am." The same yesterday, today, and forever. That is the mighty God we serve. David sang of his nature as kind and merciful in our responsorial Psalm 103. The gospel concludes his call to repentance with this parable of the fig tree and patience of the Gardener-God. Though we are encouraged to take advantage of this season of grace and his uncommon patience, to repent and be renewed, we must never take for granted the ever merciful nature of God as an excuse to remain helplessly in sin.

St. Paul warns the Corinthians against the danger of overconfidence or presumptuous loose living by recounting the story of the Israelites and how they desired evil things, and the tragic outcome of their lives as the fruit of their poor choices. God hates a fruitless life. He not only just desires us to repent alone, he

awaits the good fruits of our lives as a proof of our repentance. And so, we cannot afford to 'waste' the grace of God so lavishly available to us, because by living in effortless carelessness, we have become like the barren fig tree. The Galileans and or the others killed in Siloam are enough warning signs to us by the Lord. They and the fig tree in the gospel was presented as a great example for all of us just like the Corinthian church to work hard at repentance for as Jesus stated: "if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did." Scary! But save us O Christ, for by your cross and resurrection you have set us free.

But this should scare and help us to repent, Jesus came to remind us two things. One, that God expects us to bear fruits. And secondly, that he so knows human frailty so well that he is patient with sinners. There is a need for a change of heart, a need for growth. To grow means to GET RID OF OLD WAYS. We cannot do it alone, but Jesus is that gardener that pleads on our behalf, he would work in and on us to change us, that is, if we yield to his gentle leading and let him in. This Lent brethren, we must make every effort not to remain in sinful living. By the power of the Holy Spirit we would transform. As this parable emphasizes God's patience and the urgency of our response to the call to conversion, whoever seeks to be upright in the sight of the Lord, must strive each day to learn to do good and make justice our aim.

God is faithful and always ready to forgive. The three disciplines of Lent prayer, fasting and alms giving should be undertaken with the goal of serving God. Especially when we are blessed with material things of this world, we have automatically received a special duty to use them to serve others, particularly those in need. This will serve as fruits of repentance.
