Rejoice joy is coming!

Today as we celebrate the Laetare Sunday, we are called upon to rejoice even in the midst of the desert experience of the Lenten season. Joyful hope in anticipation of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, and the victory over sin and death. There is place called Golgotha, another name for mercy, for here the man of Calvary sets us free.

This theme of victory of the cross, comes at a price: the blood of the lamb of God, centered around the forgiveness that God willingly offers to sinful humanity and in turn, He expects us to offer it to one another. This explains why the antiphon to today's mass echoes loudly: **"Rejoice Jerusalem and all who love her, be joyful all who were in mourning, exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast".** Cf Isaiah 6610-11. Latarae Sunday took its name from this point

God has always sought to offer reconciliation to the human race again and again. But we are always rebellious and rejecting this gratuitous 'coupon' to spend grace. Take a look at the Israelites arriving at the promise land, in spite of all their infidelity, disobedience, rebellion and ingratitude, God through Joshua gave them another opportunity to enter into relationship with him. He cleanses them as by a new 'sacrament' of mercy, of reconciliation and restorative peace. This is exactly what happens to us at the confessional each time we approach the sacrament of penance.

For therein, "God, the Father of mercies, through the death and resurrection of his son has reconciled the world to himself and poured out the Holy Spirit for the forgiveness of sins; through the ministry of the church may God grant you pardon and peace." and the priest in persona Christi capitas, absolves you from your sins in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. God has indeed been faithful throughout history.

In the compelling and heart moving parable of the prodigal 'sons', we typically find ourselves fitted into the shoes of the many characters in the story. First, we have the wasteful Son who took his own inheritance and went far away to live a life of reckless irresponsibility and debauchery. And when he had spent it all, he returned back to the father's house broke, broken and empty. Does this not resonate with many of us who have taken God's chances for a ride? Many who are now taking God's graces, opportunities, blessings and patience for granted! We have spent it all many times, again and again. And when we chose to come back, the same God receives us joyfully. What a father?!

Secondly, and here again is the next story of the second 'prodigal

son', I chose to call him prodigal because while he was living in the house, he was never at home. He was a stranger in his own house, cold and insensitive. He ignorantly did not take advantage of his father's generosity all these years, he labored, he never served. And when the opportunity presented itself for him to show the love that is lavishly obvious in the father's house, it became clear he had learnt nothing, he became judgmental, condemnatory, bitter, resentful and angry. He too also squandered the opportunity to show family love to an erring brother, to bear with the weakness of the brother, and so he too is prodigal, wasteful with God's grace. Does this hit home with you?

The lavish mercy and love of God is so abundantly available to the sinner who repents. Infact, there is joy in heaven over the soul that returns home. Praise God.

Prodigality in a positive sense, seems to run in this family of God. For even their father was very "spendful" with his blessings, very lavish with his waiting for the sinner to come home. He gives, and gives and forgives, this is the nature and the heart of God. So unlike us who continues to get, and get, and still forget so easily.

As we recount God's many blessings and opportunities in our lives on this Sunday, we are confronted brothers and sisters with Saint Paul's call to us as the new Corinthians to do away with old ways of unforgiving spirit, for we are now new creatures in Christ and our ministry is the ministry of reconciliation. As Lent brings reconciliation between God and the world in Christ, and calling us to be ministers of reconciliation: Please, I too implore you too on behalf of Christ to be reconciled to God.

The gospel today is a big cry of the father's heart, God wants all his wayward children to come back to him, somebody is knocking on your door! Open your hearts and let him in, test and see his goodness King David sang. Look towards him for the strength to do this, and be radiant. Let our faces not be abashed, for when the poor call out, the Lord heard and from all their distress he saved them. Who is the poor here? It is the one who is sinful, the one who is wretched, the one who does know of his need of God is called the poor person. So that we may be able to forgive one another and celebrate the unconditional abundant love of God.

I now give everyone of us an assignment: who is that person that you find it so difficult to forgive and let go? How long have you held unto this grudge and bondage? Your penance is simple: today, go and reconcile!
